Regular Board Meeting Minutes January 12, 2022

REGULAR BUSINESS

The South Placer Fire District Board of Directors regular meeting was called to order on Wednesday, January 12, 2022, at 7:00 p.m. by President, Gary Grenfell.

<u>Special Presentation</u>: Chief Duerr noted that the presentation by the California Special District Association is cancelled and will be rescheduled for next month's meeting.

<u>Consent Agenda:</u> Director Mullin made a motion to approve the items for the consent agenda. The motion was seconded by Director Gibson.

OLD BUSINESS

Station 18 New Truck Room Update: Staff recommends discussion on the proposed project and progress made to date. Chief Duerr began that the gas meter was removed two days ago, and they are now waiting on the electric meter removal with no eta. The house demo is delayed. He explained that the project should be re-evaluated due to the costs exceeding budget estimates. He continued that he would like to meet with the facilities committee and look at options to bring back to the board. The item will return on next month's agenda for further discussion.

Employee Retention: Staff recommends discussion on current issues facing the district involving employee retention. Chief Duerr began that the district has promoted Jacob Ramirez to a Firefighter Paramedic position. There are still two openings for Firefighter with one in backgrounds. The testing process for firefighter will begin again soon. One engineer is on the hiring list and Captain and Battalion Chief testing in process. A written Captain exam will be on February 21st and the written Battalion Chief is scheduled for January 25th with the assessment center on February 21st.

Adoption of the Resolution Initiating Proceedings for the Formation of a Fire Suppression Assessment District for the South Placer Fire Protection District, Division 2: Staff recommends adoption of Resolution initiating Proposition 218 formation proceedings for a fire suppression assessment district for Division 2 and designating SCI Consulting Group as the Engineer of Work for the proceedings. Chief Duerr gave a presentation explaining the global overview of the assessment need and discussed the amount and timing of the proposed assessment. He continued that the district is currently 19% below in wages across all ranks comparatively to other agencies, and 26% below in the Firefighter rank. Reasons for the assessment included personnel costs, overtime, six additional firefighter's wages and benefits that were previously funded by a grant, the increased wildfire risk, and the changing demographic with the community growing older the need for service is increasing. He continued that there is a need to create a stable revenue source for the district to provide solvency and sustainability. A special tax would take a one-day general election at a cost of \$90,000 while a special assessment would have a 45-day mail in ballot at a cost of \$75,000. Chief Duerr explained that at this time he recommends pursuing the additional funding for a fire suppression assessment. assessment would bring in \$2.4 million per year with a CPI that would have a maximum cap. The \$70 special tax in Division 2 would remain at \$70. He noted that with no change to current operations the district will be operating in the negative of \$-1.8 million by 2026/27. Impacts to the homeowner in Division 2 will be a \$240 increase in property taxes, amounting to a total \$310-315 average assessment to be paid to the Fire District. To continue with the assessment, SCI Consulting have prepared a Resolution to initiate proceedings to pursue a fire suppression assessment. The first step to begin the process is procuring the assessment engineering for the Engineer's report prepared by a civil engineer and assessment engineer. The draft report will then be presented to the Board for first reading and initial approval with a final copy to be approved by the Board thereafter at the second reading. With levies due in August, the timeline could be March/April approval of Engineer's report, ballots out in May/June with July /August for counting of the results and possibly levy submittal. This timeline would ensure a December 2022 payment of assessment to the district. Director Musso made a motion to approve the Resolution to initiate proceedings for the formation of a fire suppression assessment for Division 2. Director Grenfell made a second to the motion.

January 2022

On January 3, the California State Legislature reconvened for the second year of the two-year biennial Legislative Session in the midst of another COVID-19 surge. In addition to continuing to respond to the pandemic, the Governor's State Budget proposal and numerous bill deadlines are forthcoming. Chief among them being the January 31 house of origin deadline for two-year bills.

Allocations from the CSDA-sponsored \$100 million COVID-19 Independent Special District Relief Fund are due to recipients by January 15. This relief from California's General Fund, approved by the Governor and State Legislature as part of the 2021-22 State Budget is directed to special districts otherwise left out of COVID-19 relief funding and is intended to complement other sources of relief including funding for utility arrearages and ports and harbors.

In the coming year, CSDA will keep fighting for special districts and the communities they serve in a number of key areas, including:

- > Funding climate adaptation and resilience
 - Confronting drought, wildfire, flooding, and emissions
- > Putting infrastructure funding to work
 - Promoting efficient and responsible stewardship of public funds
- > Supporting increased local services to support increased housing
 - Enhancing, not limiting, local funding tools for growing communities
- > Building and equipping a sustainable and specialized workforce
 - Ensuring today's frontline workers have the skills our communities need
- > Safeguarding our communities' assets from cyber threats
 - Deploying critical cybersecurity resources, tools, and trainings

COVID-19 RELIEF FUNDING

CSDA's advocacy action priority is to work with the Administration, various state agencies, and the federal government to ensure special districts receive equitable access to COVID-19 relief funding should it become available.

COVID-19 Special District Relief Funds Allocated to Communities in Need

After over a year of hard work on your behalf, and in coordination with individual special districts, stakeholders, and local government partners, the robust effort to obtain COVID-19 fiscal relief is coming to a close, with special districts beginning to receive critical funds to meet the needs of the communities they serve. Below is a recap of the various funds and the status of allocations.

\$100 MILLION COVID-19 RELIEF FUND FOR INDEPENDENT SPECIAL DISTRICTS THAT CAN DEMONSTRATE FISCAL IMPACTS DUE TO THE COVID-19 PUBLIC HEALTH EMERGENCY

- The California Department of Finance (DOF) released the schedule of funding to the State Controller's Office (SCO) in December, the SCO released funding to county-auditor controllers by December 15 and DOF notified special districts who had applied as to their status at that time. Per statute, county-auditor controllers have 30 days to disperse the funding to the identified districts. <a href="https://doi.org/10.1007/jhtml.com/richard-notation-

- CSDA has provided a "Thank Your Legislator Toolkit" for special districts who received funding.
 These resources are available for download on the <u>CSDA COVID-19 Take Action page</u> and include sample social media posts, a template thank you letter, press release, and guidelines for submitting letters to the editor.

As you may know, CSDA secured these funds statewide for independent districts like yours. Our advocacy efforts included:

- Building a statewide coalition of over 750 signatories.
- Conducting over 100 meetings with State Legislators and their staff.
- Holding more than 60 meetings with Administration officials, DOF, committee staff, and Legislative leadership.
- Bringing forward over 200 special district officials to tell their stories following a prep session with CSDA.

NEARLY \$1 BILLION IN WATER UTILITY HOUSEHOLD ASSISTANCE

The deadline for application or the California Water and Wastewater Arrearage Payment Program has closed. Through \$985 million in federal funding allocated by the State Legislature, the State Water Board administered a new program to provide relief to community water and wastewater systems for unpaid bills related to the pandemic. The funding covers water debt from residential and commercial customers accrued between March 4, 2020 and June 15, 2021 and initially prioritized drinking water residential and commercial arrearages. Funding to these community water systems will be disbursed through January 31, 2022.

If the Program still has funding available, which is anticipated, the program will be extended to wastewater residential and commercial arrearages by February 2022. More information is available on the State Water Board's website for this fund here.

NEARLY \$1 BILLION IN ENERGY UTILITY HOUSEHOLD ASSISTANCE.

The California Arrearage Payment Program (CAPP) offers financial assistance for California energy utility customers to help reduce past due energy bill balances that increased during the COVID-19 pandemic. Established by Governor Gavin Newsom and the California Legislature in the 2021-22 State Budget and administered by the Department of Community Services and Development (CSD), the CAPP program dedicates \$1 billion in federal American Rescue Plan Act funding to address Californian's energy debts. Utility customers do not need to apply to receive assistance under the CAPP program. If a customer account is eligible, a credit will be automatically applied to the customer's bill. Energy utilities will apply for CAPP assistance on behalf of customers who incurred a past due balance of 60 days or more on their energy bill during the COVID-19 pandemic relief period covering March 4, 2020 through June 15, 2021. More information on the status of this program is available on CSD's website for this fund.

This program is administrated in four phases:

- Phase 1: Utility Survey Completed
- Phase 2: CAPP Application In Progress
- Phase 3: CAPP Allocations Awarded In Progress
- Phase 4: Utility Outcomes Reporting Not yet started

\$250 MILLION IN ECONOMIC ASSISTANCE CALIFORNIA'S PUBLIC PORTS.

The California State Lands Commission (SLC) authorized disbursement of roughly \$136 million from the \$250M allocated in the state budget to six California ports to mitigate negative economic impacts resulting from the pandemic and to support ports' economic recovery based on their revenue losses resulting from the COVID-19 pandemic. Ports that either did not apply during this disbursement tranche, or that received an amount less than their requested amount, may reapply for the roughly \$113 million in remaining funding and the Commission will consider those funding requests at a future meeting. None of these remarkable accomplishments to secure financial resources for special districts would have been possible without the support of special districts like yours through membership and your willingness to engage in advocacy efforts on behalf of your communities. On behalf of the special district community, CSDA thanks the 259 special districts that submitted letters of support, more than 200 special district leaders who participated in our Zoom meetings with legislative offices, and the many coalition partners who came together for this unprecedented moment.

> INFRASTRUCTURE, INNOVATION, AND INVESTMENT

CSDA's long range policy principal regarding infrastructure, innovation, and investment is to encourage prudent planning for investment and maintenance of innovative long-term infrastructure. CSDA supports the development of fiscal tools and incentives to assist special districts in their efforts to meet California's changing demands, ensuring the efficient and effective delivery of core local services.

Contractor Registration Penalties

CSDA has received input that some local agencies acting in good faith have incurred penalties from the Department of Industrial Relations (DIR) for having unregistered subcontractors on their projects that were:

- Unknown to the agency and not required "listed" contractors on the project under the Public Contracting Code;
- Discovered as soon as possible and immediately ordered off the project until registration is achieved; and
- The violation was self-reported by the local agency to DIR.

Punishing local agencies for self-reporting violations seemingly runs counter to the intent of the law.

Is your agency affected? CSDA needs to know the scope of the problem.

- 1) Has your agency experienced a fine for a violation as noted above?
- 2) What is the process by which your agency screens for changes in contractors/registration status and is able to discover unregistered subcontractors?
- 3) Does your agency know of alternative solutions that do not require statutory changes, such as employing indemnification provisions within its contracts that address this specific situation?

Background

- Section 21 of SB 96 (Chapter 28, 2017) amended Section 1773.3 of the Labor Code to require an
 awarding agency to provide notice to DIR within 30 days and never later than the first day in which a
 contractor has workers employed upon the public work of any public works contract.
- An awarding agency that fails to provide the notice required or that enters into a contract with or
 permits an unregistered contractor or subcontractor to engage in the performance of any public work
 in violation of the requirements is subject to a civil penalty of one hundred dollars (\$100) for each
 day in violation of either requirement, not to exceed an aggregate penalty of ten thousand dollars
 (\$10,000) for each project.
- An awarding agency must withhold final payment due to the contractor until at least 30 days after all
 of the required information has been submitted, including a complete list of all subcontractors. If an
 awarding agency makes a final payment to a contractor after that time and an unregistered
 contractor or subcontractor is found to have worked on the project, the awarding agency is subject to
 a civil penalty assessed by the Labor Commissioner of one hundred dollars (\$100) for each full
 calendar day of noncompliance.

Federal Infrastructure Package Resources, Webinar, and 'Project Idea Portal'

The National Special Districts Coalition (NSDC) has published a special report outlining newly authorized and updated programs included in the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act (IIJA) and launched a "Project Idea Portal" to help CSDA members identify funding opportunities. NSDC will host a webinar for members next month to provide an overview of IIJA.

NSDC Special Report

The <u>NSDC special report</u> includes brief summaries of IIJA's 45 new federal programs and details 36 programs the law revised/updated.

Each summary serves as a grant profile provided by CSDA business affiliate The Ferguson Group (TFG), which offers a <u>suite of grant services</u> to Coalition members. As many of IIJA's programs are in the development process, the guide provides advanced details for special districts to identify potential funding sources and prepare to act once application periods open.

NSDC Webinar

NSDC's advocacy team will host a webinar covering IIJA and provide a deeper dive into key programs outlined in the special report. CSDA members are invited to join to learn more about programs of interest and engage in Q&A.

Virtual Special Districts Tour Highlights Leaders in Climate Adaptation and Resilience

On December 7, 2021, dozens of policymakers from Sacramento and Washington D.C. participated virtually in a live tour of three special districts at the forefront of climate adaptation and resilience. The 90-minute tour organized by CSDA highlighted special districts taking on droughts and flooding with new technology, protecting lives and property in the wildland urban interface, and paving the way to zero emissions bus fleets. The full tour, along with five-minute videos overviewing the three featured special districts, is now available at csda.net/specialdistrictstour.

The 2021 virtual tour demonstrated how special districts are empowering communities to meet some of California's biggest challenges. The three featured special districts included:

- <u>Sonoma Water</u>: Preparing for Atmospheric Rivers, Preventing Flooding, and Managing Water Resources by Piloting a Next-Generation Radar System Through a Multi-Agency Effort
- <u>Paradise Recreation and Park District</u>: Reimagining Community Safety and Wellbeing within the Wildland Urban Interface, and Facilitating Responsible Housing, by Integrating Parkland as Essential Natural Infrastructure
- <u>AC Transit</u>: Leading the Way to a 2040 Zero Emission Bus Fleet Through Workforce Training, Data Integration, and Deployment of Fuel Cell and Battery Electric Transportation

In addition to video overviews of leading-edge projects, the recorded virtual tour includes presentations from Sonoma Water General Manager Grant Davis, Paradise Recreation and Park District Manager Dan Efseaff, and AC Transit Legislative Affairs and Community Relations Director Claudia Burgos.

CSDA is pleased to share this virtual tour with special district officials and other decisionmakers interested in learning more from local service specialists confronting drought, wildfire, flooding, and emissions. A participant packet is also available for download and review.

> GOVERNANCE AND ACCOUNTABILITY

CSDA's long range policy priority on governance and accountability is to enhance special districts' ability to govern as independent, local government bodies in an open and accessible manner. Encourage best practices that avoid burdensome, costly, redundant, or one-size-fits all approaches. Protect meaningful public participation in local agency formations, dissolutions, and reorganizations, and ensure local services meet the unique needs, priorities, and preference of each community

LAFCOs Propose Changes to Extension of Services Exemptions

The California Association of Local Agency Formation Commissions (CALAFCO) and the San Diego County Local Agency Formation Commission are floating new legislation to amend a long-standing series of exemptions to the Cortese-Knox-Hertzberg act of 2000 regarding the extension of services by contract or agreement outside jurisdictional boundary. CSDA seeks your input and feedback in assessing and responding to the draft proposal.

Specifically, this proposal would seek to amend <u>GC 56133(e)</u>, a code section which deals with extension of services beyond an agency(ie)'s boundaries but has exceptions, such as where two public agencies contract for like services, among others.

This proposal would require a local agency, including a special district or city, seeking to use the exception in the code to instead obtain a legal determination from their LAFCO (Executive Officer and/or Commission) as to whether the statutory exemption applies to that agency(ie)'s situation.

How the proposal might look. The below is existing law with the proposed amendment in italics and bold:

Government Code Section 56133.

- (a) A city or district may provide new or extended services by contract or agreement outside its jurisdictional boundary only if it first requests and receives written approval from the commission.
- (b) The commission may authorize a city or district to provide new or extended services outside its jurisdictional boundary but within its sphere of influence in anticipation of a later change of organization.
- (c) The commission may authorize a city or district to provide new or extended services outside its jurisdictional boundary and outside its sphere of influence to respond to an existing or impending threat to the health or safety of the public or the residents of the affected territory, if both of the following requirements are met:
- (1) The entity applying for approval has provided the commission with documentation of a threat to the health and safety of the public or the affected residents.
- (2) The commission has notified any alternate service provider, including any water corporation as defined in Section 241 of the Public Utilities Code, that has filed a map and a statement of its service capabilities with the commission
- (d) The executive officer, within 30 days of receipt of a request for approval by a city or district to extend services outside its jurisdictional boundary, shall determine whether the request is complete and acceptable for filing or whether the request is incomplete. If a request is determined not to be complete, the executive officer shall immediately transmit that determination to the requester, specifying those parts of the request that are incomplete and the manner in which they can be made complete. When the request is deemed complete, the executive officer shall place the request on the agenda of the next commission meeting for which adequate notice can be given but not more than 90 days from the date that the request is deemed complete, unless the commission has delegated approval of requests made pursuant to this section to the executive officer. The commission or executive officer shall approve, disapprove, or approve with conditions the extended services. If the new or extended services are disapproved or approved with conditions, the applicant may request reconsideration, citing the reasons for reconsideration.
- (e) This section does not apply to any of the following: *[Insert: "as determined by the Commission or the Executive Officer"]*

- (1) Two or more public agencies where the public service to be provided is an alternative to, or substitute for, public services already being provided by an existing public service provider and where the level of service to be provided is consistent with the level of service contemplated by the existing service provider.
- (2) The transfer of nonpotable or nontreated water.
- (3) The provision of surplus water to agricultural lands and facilities, including, but not limited to, incidental residential structures, for projects that serve conservation purposes or that directly support agricultural industries. However, prior to extending surplus water service to any project that will support or induce development, the city or district shall first request and receive written approval from the commission in the affected county.
- (4) An extended service that a city or district was providing on or before January 1, 2001.
- (5) A local publicly owned electric utility, as defined by Section 9604 of the Public Utilities Code, providing electric services that do not involve the acquisition, construction, or installation of electric distribution facilities by the local publicly owned electric utility, outside of the utility's jurisdictional boundary.
- (6) A fire protection contract, as defined in subdivision (a) of Section 56134.
- (f) This section applies only to the commission of the county in which the extension of service is proposed. (Amended by Stats. 2019, Ch. 20, Sec. 3. (AB 1822) Effective January 1, 2020.)

- 2. Would altering this statutory exemption as outlined above create issues for your agency?

> LEGAL ADVOCACY

CSDA is the leading legal advocacy voice for all special districts regarding public policy in California and actively tracks and reviews cases of significance affecting special districts in state and federal courts. Under the guidance of CSDA's Legal Advisory Working Group, CSDA files amicus briefs and opines on court cases when appropriate.

CA Supreme Court Rules that Property Owners are not Required to Object to Prop 218 Fees and Charges at a Public Hearing to File Suit

On December 20, 2021, the California Supreme Court ruled that a property owner seeking to challenge a proposed assessment is not required to present their objection(s) at the public hearings held to consider the adoption of the assessment in order to later file suit against the assessment in court. In a unanimous decision in Hill RHF Housing Partners, L.P., et al. v. City of Los Angeles (\$263734), the Supreme Court declined to infer that a plaintiff is required to appear at the public hearing to present their objections (thereby exhausting an administrative remedy) before they could file suit to challenge the proposed assessment based on an assertion that the assessment violates Proposition 218.

Although the decision is unfavorable for special districts that adopt fees and charges subject to Proposition 218, it does not affect the procedural or substantive process districts are required to follow pursuant to Proposition 218. On April 1, 2021, CSDA joined a coalition to file an amicus brief in favor of the City of Los Angeles, urging the Court to rule that potential plaintiffs should be required to present their objection(s) to an assessment at the public hearings to consider or adopt the assessment, also known as exhausting an "administrative remedy," before they are permitted to bring a challenge to the assessment pursuant to Proposition 218 in court. The CSDA brief argued that the exhaustion doctrine "Improves Administrative and Judicial Decision-Making, Reduces Wasteful and Counter-Productive Litigation Tactics, Protects Administrative Autonomy and Separation of Powers, and Applies to Public Agencies' Quasi-Adjudicatory and Legislative Acts."

Unfortunately, the Supreme Court disagreed and reversed a favorable decision from the Court of Appeal. The Supreme Court decision focused on the process of Proposition 218 public hearings, finding that the opportunity to comment in a Prop 218 hearing "does not involve the sort of 'clearly defined machinery for the submission, evaluation and resolution of complaints by aggrieved parties," that would require the court to infer an exhaustion requirement for the plaintiff. Writing in a unanimous decision, Chief Justice Tani Cantil-Sakauye argued that a requirement that objections be considered, by itself, places no legal obligation upon the agency to respond to objections to an assessment. Ultimately, the Court determined that "a process proffered as an administrative remedy does not have to be exhausted when its dispute resolution procedures are so meager that it cannot fairly be regarded as a remedy at all."

Agenda Item: Station 18 New Truck Room Update:

Action Requested: Chief recommends discussion on the progress made on the project.

Background:

The costs to complete the initial phase of the project, which includes demolition of the training house and constructing the wall, are:

- PNP estimate for phase 1 of this project wall construction and structure demolition:
 - Wall Construction \$86,532
 - House demolition \$36,929
- Total Cost Estimate \$125,000

House demo and wall construction are moving forward. PG&E has removed both gas and electrical meters so the demolition can begin. PNP construction is aware and in the planning process for demolition pending a two (2) week notification of neighbors as this is a commercial demolition project. The notification was made around January 26th, and demolition is tentatively scheduled for the second week in February.

Staff recommends reevaluating this project. Although considerable money has been spent, the original budget of \$1.5m is no longer adequate to complete the building as designed. A recent bid revision places the cost to complete at \$2.6m.

Working with the facilities committee, some ideas for consideration include:

Options:

1. App bay expansion – expand the existing app bay to the maximum width and increase the height and depth to accommodate the larger/longer apparatus. In the new apparatus space, incorporate a storage area and decontamination space away

from the truck room floor to protect against carcinogens. This proposal also includes light updates to the interior spaces, including adding support for the gym room floor, new flooring throughout, and adding Photovoltaic solar to reduce district electrical costs.

- 2. Complete the apparatus bay extension above with no additional modifications to the interior.
- 3. New truck room as proposed minus the add ons Construct the proposed truck room without the living space/storage additions. This option would save approximately \$750k in construction cost with a new estimate of \$1,650,000. The additional infill could be completed later when the district can allocate funding.

Impact: Overall project concept and costs.

- **Firefighter** Two (2) vacant potions. We are working with a vendor to establish a new hiring list with a projected timeline of two to three months to establish a list.
- Engineer No vacancies at this time with one candidate on the existing list
- Captain One (1) vacancy with application period closing February 4th. Written test scheduled for the third week in February.
- **Battalion Chief** One (1) vacancy. Written test was held on January 25th with nine (9) candidates. We are waiting for the written results, but successful candidates will complete an assessment center the week of February 21st.
- **Division Chief of EMS/Safety** Application and testing process complete with a candidate in the hiring process (pre-employment screening) with an anticipated start date of February 28th.

Impact: Increased awareness of retention issues at all ranks.

POLICY TITLE: Station 19 Memorial Plaque Adopted Date: 11/30/2005

POLICY NUMBER: 2510 Revision Date: 11/30/2005

2510.1 In August of 2003, Fire Station 19, located at 7070 Auburn Folsom Road, was dedicated as the South Placer Fire District's Memorial Fire Station. During the dedication ceremony a memorial plaque was unveiled displaying the names of individuals that had served the community as a member of the South Placer Fire District (District) and had passed away. The intent of the dedication was to allow future names to be added to the memorial plaque.

2510.1.1 Members of the fire district may serve in many ways. Members may serve as firefighters (Volunteer, Paid or Part Paid), Administrators, Board Members or Community Members who have positively impacted service to the Community. Typical ways for individuals to impact the community while serving the district may include, but are not limited to:

- **2510.1.1.1** Died in the line of duty.
- **2510.1.1.2** Served the district for his or her entire career.
- **2510.1.1.3** Served the fire service for more than twenty years, with a significant portion of the service with the district.
- **2510.1.1.4** Performed a life-saving act under extremely dangerous and hazardous conditions.
- **2510.1.1.5** Developed and implemented policy, procedures, guidelines or other programs that had a long lasting effect on the Community, Surrounding Communities and/or the State Of California Fire Service.
- **2510.1.2** Any Fire District Member or Community Member may request a name be added to the memorial plaque after a fire district member has passed by:

1. Remove "apply for CSFM Certified Fire Apparatus Driver/Operator Pump Apparatus after 18 months." Personnel are able to achieve the qualification, but we are not making it a mandatory condition for promotion.

SOUTH PLACER FIRE DISTRICT POLICY MANUAL

POLICY TITLE: Engineer Job Classification Adopted Date: 7/1/2002

POLICY NUMBER: 1180 Revision Date: 1/10/2019

General Job Description: The South Placer Fire District is a tax supported governmental agency, which provides emergency and non-emergency services to the Community of the South Placer Fire District and other communities under local agreements and the California State Mutual Aid Plan. This work unit is responsible for tasks associated with fire suppression, hazardous condition mitigation, emergency rescue, medical treatment and pre/post emergency activities. The work unit works 24-hour shifts or as needed for emergency or staffing call back.

Specific Duties: Working under the supervision of the Captain/Acting Captain and/or Supervisor this employee's primary duty is to respond to emergency situations and perform tasks associated with fire suppression, hazardous condition mitigation, emergency rescue and medical treatment. When responding to such emergencies the employee shall don all required protective clothing and the employee may:

- 1. Receive and implement directives from ranking employees
- 2. Remove hoses, nozzles, ladders and other appropriate equipment from apparatus, connecting hoses to water supply and direct extinguishing agent as appropriate
- 3. Drive and operate emergency apparatus and other equipment associated with fire suppression, hazardous condition mitigation, emergency rescue, medical treatment and district operations
- 4. Operate tools associated with fire suppression, hazardous condition mitigation, emergency rescue, medical treatment and district operations
- 5. Troubleshoot equipment, apparatus and make emergency repairs
- 6. Carry ladders, erect ladders and climb ladders typically while carrying equipment
- 7. Create openings in structures to allow access, egress or facilitate fire suppression
- 8. Move, cover and otherwise protect personal property
- 9. Walk or jog for extended distances carrying equipment and/or individuals
- 10. Provide basic life support and assist with advanced life support
- 11. Provide continuous patient and situation assessment
- 12. Prepare individuals for transport to a medical treatment facility and transport patients while either driving the ambulance or providing appropriate treatment
- 13. Triage multiple injury emergencies and manage medical treatment for such emergencies
- 14. Remove patients/victims from difficult to access locations

- 15. Perform rescues that involve moving waters or stagnant bodies of water
- 16. Gather and load equipment onto the vehicle for return to the facility

It should be noted that many of the tasks performed in this job require extended, strenuous physical exertion in dangerous conditions. The employee shall work as a member of a team, all of whose members are interdependent on other members of the team for their safety and for the successful accomplishment of the tasks. Due to the wide range of activities and conditions inherent in this job, the frequencies and duration of physical activities may vary significantly from day to day and employees may be required to perform other duties related to the districts mission statement.

Corollary Duties: When not responding to emergencies, the employees will perform a variety of tasks in and around district facilities and the community. The employee shall:

- 1. Assist to complete the duties outlined in the work schedule
- 2. Inspect, clean, test and service equipment
- 3. Inventory and replenish fire apparatus supplies, medical supplies and station supplies
- 4. Wash, clean, and perform routine maintenance on emergency apparatus and district vehicles
- 5. Perform routine housekeeping, ground maintenance, inspections and minor repairs on district facilities
- 6. Assist with station and district projects
- 7. Develop recommendations and strategies as to the operation of the station, shift and projects to which they are assigned
- 8. Develop and submit annual budget recommendations for the station, shift and projects to which they are assigned
- 9. Make budget recommendations for the purchasing of equipment, facility needs and supplies for the station, shift and projects to which they are assigned
- 10. Maintain, review for accuracy station, shift and project records and submit as required
- 11. Organize, present and/or participate in field training exercises, self-study, self-improvement and classroom instruction
- 12. Participate in self-directed physical conditioning activities
- 13. Organize and/or participate in pre-emergency, post-emergency and public safety educational activities
- 14. Complete both written and computer generated reports as required.
- 15. Be encouraged to participate on teams or work on projects involving district operations, construction, supply organization, new apparatus design, research and report development

Minimum Qualifications:

- 1. The employee shall be high school graduate or equivalent
- 2. The employee shall be a minimum of 18 years of age

- 3. The employee shall maintain a valid California Class A, B, or C driver's license and a Firefighter endorsement.
- 4. The employee shall maintain a valid Medical Examination Report (DL 51) form for a CDL or complete medical requirements for a non-commercial driver's license with a Firefighter endorsement per the department of motor vehicles.
- 5. The employee shall maintain a valid respiratory qualified medical exam
- 6. The employee shall maintain a valid BLS/CPR card from American Heart or Red Cross
- 7. The employee shall maintain a valid State of California Emergency Medical Technician 1 certification or Sierra Sacramento Valley Paramedic certification
- 8. Hazardous Materials First Responders Operational Certificate
- 9. ICS 200 Certificate
- 10. CSFM Rescue Systems 1 Certificate
- 11. Driver Operator 1A and 1B
- 12. Apply for CSFM Certified Fire Apparatus Driver/Operator Pump Apparatus after eighteen (18) months
- <u>13.12.</u> CSFM Certified Firefighter I
- 14.13. Obtain qualifications/certifications for Firefighter I per NWCG/CICCS. (2006 Editions or newer/ this requirement to be completed within twelve (12) months of hire date)
- 15.14. Either two (2) years of satisfactory service as a full time South Placer Firefighter (with designations of EMT and or Paramedic) or Three (3) years as a full paid full time firefighter with another agency (with designations of EMT and or Paramedic)

Desirable Qualifications: Any combination of training, education or experience that would likely provide the required knowledge and skills in qualifying. A typical way to obtain the knowledge and skills would be:

- 1. Training from a recognized national, state or privately operated training facility in the area of fire science, emergency services or other related fields or
- 2. An educational degree from a recognized national, state or privately operated training facility in the area of fire science, emergency services or other related fields

Standards: The employee shall acquire and apply the knowledge of the district rules, regulations, procedures, methods and techniques on a continuous basis. Maintain the mental condition, physical endurance, agility, strength and stamina to perform hazardous work under emergency conditions. Maintain the ability to understand and follow oral and written directions promptly and accurately. Continuously be courteous to the public, allied agencies and fellow employees.

The cost for each year of the new proposed three-year contract are: 2022/23, \$12,250; 2023/24, \$12,585; and 2024/25, \$12,935.

Levy Administration Services Agreement

THIS AGREEMENT is made on _______, 20___, between the **South Placer Fire Protection District**, ("District") and **SCI Consulting Group** ("Consultant" or "SCI"), a California Corporation, who agree as follows:

Scope of Work ("Work"). Consultant shall perform the work and render the services
described in the Scope of Work shown below (the "Work"). The Consultant shall provide
all labor, equipment, material and supplies required or necessary to properly and
competently perform the Work, and determine the method, details and means of doing
the Work.

2. Payment.

- a. In exchange for the Work, District shall pay to the Consultant a fee for completed phases of the Work. The total fee for the Work shall not exceed amounts set forth in the Fee Schedule shown below. There shall be no compensation for extra or additional work or services by the Consultant unless approved in advance in writing by District. The Consultant's fee shall include all of the Consultant's costs and expenses related to the Work.
- b. At the completion of each phase of the Work, the Consultant shall submit to the District an invoice for the Work performed. If the Work is satisfactorily completed and the invoice is accurately computed, the District shall pay the invoice within 30 days of its receipt.
- 3. **Term.** This Agreement shall take effect on the above date and shall continue in effect until completion of the Work.

4. Insurance.

a. Types & Limits. The Consultant, at its sole cost and expense, shall procure and maintain for the duration of this Agreement the following types and limits of insurance:

\$2,000,000 per occurrence \$4,000,000 aggregate
\$2,000,000 per accident
Statutory limits
\$2,000,000 per claim
\$1,000,000 per occurrence
& \$1,000,000 aggregate

b. **Other Requirements.** The general liability policy(ies) shall be endorsed to name the District, its officers and employees as additional insureds regarding liability arising out of the Work.

- c. **Proof of Insurance.** Upon request, the Consultant shall provide to the District proof of insurance.
- 5. Indemnification. The Consultant shall indemnify, defend, protect, and hold harmless the District, and its officers and employees from and against any and all liability, losses, claims, damages, expenses, demands, and costs (including, but not limited to, attorney, expert witness and consultant fees, and litigation costs) arising out of the Consultant's performance of the Work and caused by willful misconduct of or by the Consultant or its employees, agents and subcontractors.
- 6. Entire Agreement. This writing represents the sole, final, complete, exclusive and integrated expression and statement of the terms of this contract between the parties concerning the Work, and supersedes all prior oral and/or written negotiations, representations or contracts. This Agreement may be amended only by a subsequent written contract approved and executed by both parties.
- 7. **Independent Contractor.** The Consultant's relationship to the District is that of an independent contractor.
- **8. Successors and Assignment.** This Agreement shall bind and inure to the benefit of the heirs, successors and assigns of the parties; however, the Consultant shall not subcontract, assign or transfer this Agreement or any part of it without the prior written consent of the District.
- No Waiver of Rights. Any waiver at any time by either party of its rights as to a breach or default of this Agreement shall not be deemed to be a waiver as to any other breach or default.
- 10. **Severability.** If any part of this Agreement is held to be void, invalid or unenforceable, then the remaining parts will nevertheless continue in full force and effect.
- 11. **Governing Law and Venue.** This Agreement will be governed by and construed in accordance with the laws of the State of California.
- 12. **Default.** In the event that the Consultant defaults in the obligations of the Consultant under this Agreement, or the Consultant defaults in the performance of the terms and conditions of this Agreement, the District may, at its option, declare this Agreement to be in default and, at any time thereafter, may do any one or more of the following: a) enforce performance of the Agreement by the Consultant; or b) terminate this Agreement. In the event that this Agreement is terminated, payment shall still be due for all Work performed by the Consultant through the date of the termination.
- 13. **Cancellation.** The District or the Consultant may cancel this Agreement without cause. The party desiring to cancel this Agreement shall notify the other party in writing. In the event that this Agreement is cancelled, payment shall still be due for all Work performed by the Consultant through the date of the notification of cancellation.
- 14. **Attorney's Fees.** In the event any legal action is brought to enforce or construe this Agreement, the prevailing party shall be entitled to an award of reasonable attorney's fees, expert witness and consulting fees, and litigation costs.

15. **Notice.** Any notice, invoice or other communication that is required or permitted to be given under this Agreement shall be in writing and either served personally or sent by prepaid, first class U.S. mail or by commercial delivery service, addressed as follows:

Scope of Work

This section outlines the engineering services and other responsibilities SCI would perform as the Engineer of Work and Assessment Levy Administrator for South Placer Fire Protection District.

Definitions

District: South Placer Fire Protection District, staff and Directors.

Assessment District: Fire Protection and Emergency Response Services Assessment District

(former Loomis Fire Protection District).

SCI or Consultant: SCI Consulting Group, and any and all employees and subcontractors.

Administration: Services related to the determination, levy and collection of assessment

revenues.

Engineer's Report and Other Documents

1. Obtain upcoming fiscal year estimated cost information from the District to use as a basis for the budget in the Engineer's Report.

- 2. Calculate and prepare the preliminary assessment roll for inclusion in the Engineer's Report.
- 3. Prepare the Engineer's Report, including any necessary upgrades due to any recent court rulings or other requirements.
- 4. File the final Engineer's Report with the District.
- 5. Prepare any needed resolutions and staff reports for the Assessment.
- 6. Prepare and assist with the publication of any notices for the continuation of the Assessment.
- 7. Attend the District Board meeting at which the public hearing is held, and the Engineer's Report is approved.

Confirmation of District Parcels, Levy Calculation, Verification and Submittal

- 1. Create a database including every parcel in the boundaries of the Assessment District, including the parcel attributes necessary for calculating the Assessments, and update it with new information for the upcoming year.
- 2. Identify new or changed parcels that may require an updated or new assessment calculation and recalculate the final assessment on a parcel-by-parcel basis.
- 3. Prepare the final Assessment Roll for the Assessment District and submit it to the County for inclusion on the upcoming fiscal year tax bills.

District Information and Levy Confirmation

1. Verify and validate Auditor's levy data prior to the printing of tax bills.

Responding To Public Inquiries And Appeals

- 1. Provide the County Auditor/Tax Collector with our toll-free phone number so property owners can directly contact SCI Consulting Group throughout the fiscal year regarding any questions that arise.
- Throughout the fiscal year, research and, if necessary, revise any Assessments which we
 find to be based upon incorrect information being used to apply the method of
 assessment. (It should be noted that, due to our comprehensive levy validation
 procedures, actual revisions are expected to be very minimal, if any.)

Defense and Support of the Assessments

- 1. Provide a full response, support of the assessments and basis for the assessments to any person who questions the assessments or the legal basis for the assessments.
- 2. In the event of any legal challenge or petition against the assessments, provide professional, assessment engineering and technical support in support of the assessments. If such services are required, they would be provided in close collaboration with the District and District legal counsel.

- 1. The Scope of Work includes one meeting with the District. Any additional meetings shall be billed at the rate of \$500 per person per meeting.

- 3. Incidental costs incurred by SCI for the purchase of property data, maps, travel and other out-of-pocket expenses incurred in performing the Scope of Work shall be reimbursed at actual cost by the District with total cost not to exceed \$1,000 per year, without prior authorization from the District. Publication of the legal notice of public hearing will be billed separately as incurred.

Note: All costs associated with this proposal can be financed or refunded by assessment proceeds.

Agenda Item: NFPA 1582 Compliant District Physicals

Action Requested: The Chief recommends a discussion on implementing National Fire Protection Association 1582 physicals.

Background: Due to occupational demands, firefighters face extreme physical, mental, and environmental stresses resulting in an increased risk of morbidity and mortality for cardiovascular events, musculoskeletal injuries, behavioral health issues, and cancer. Early detection of underlying medical conditions and participation in annual medical exams is critical to saving firefighter lives and improving their quality of life.

Currently, our members receive a complete physical before being hired to confirm they can perform the job's tasks. For nearly all of our members, that was the last time they had a department-sponsored physical. Some members likely participate in annual physicals on their own. Still, routine annual physicals often omit the job-specific test included in NFPA 1582 that is vital to ensuring the health and wellbeing of our members while performing their job tasks.

Labor and management have worked together to implement a program that will protect our most valuable assets, our personnel, through a comprehensive mental health and wellness program. Physicals are one of many programs that will increase our District's health and readiness. Other programs under the health and wellness umbrella include:

- NFPA 1582 firefighter physicals for entry-level candidates;
- A mental health program staffed by District personnel and backed with the support of Local 522 and management;
- A joint management/Labor District Occupational Safety and Health Committee;
- Annual fitness assessments in conjunction with IAFF Wellness-Fitness Initiative;

- An NFPA 1582 compliant annual physical evaluation with a goal not to remove firefighters from duty but to protect their health and safety by ensuring members are medically able to meet the job's demands;
- Continuously evaluate job demands and ensure job descriptions/analyses are provided to health care providers so that task demands align with medical evaluations.

While this process will cost the district money, the ultimate risk to the district and the community of not implementing a program is the loss of life of our members. Recent studies and surveys suggest a severe gap in the healthcare of our members.

- According to the *National Fire Protection Association's Firefighter Fatalities in the United States 2016*, cardiac-related events accounted for 38 percent of firefighter deaths in 2016 and 42 percent over the past ten years.
- Research by Denise Smith, Ph.D., and others found that for every line of duty death, there are an estimated 17 nonfatal cardiac events on duty among firefighters.

An annual physical is a vital component of an organization's comprehensive benefits strategy. Organizations provide benefits to recruit and retain employees and keep them well and fit. This program provides health and financial security through annual evaluation, emphasizing early detection. The increased morbidity and mortality related to firefighting work can devastate a career, financial security, and family. The goal is to help firefighters remain healthy and on-duty, benefitting the employee and the organization who invested in their training and experience.

Regular medical evaluations are so vital that our vendor, Fire Agencies Self Insurance System (FASIS), offsets the cost of these physicals by approximately 75% every three years. They have found that prevention and early detection reduce long term expenses.

Finally, the District is responsible for ensuring that all members engaged in fire suppression can perform the job of a firefighter including Cal OSHA mandates including:

- 1. Annual fit testing for every member using a respirator.
- 2. For those members using a respirator, provide a medical evaluation to utilizing a respiratory questionnaire and complete a pulmonary function test.
- 3. Audiometric testing as part of a hearing conservation program.

The costs to provide NFPA 1582 physicals, including full chest X-rays for all members, with the FASIS offset, is approximately \$14,300. The cost for the previously mentioned minimum requirements under the law is \$9,200 which does not include the in-depth, job-specific evaluations of the NFPA 1582 physical. Proceeding with the full exams will cost the District an additional \$5,100.
